2025 PSNZ ANNUAL MEETING



The networks utilised the PSNZ annual meeting as a platform to showcase their initiatives and exchange insights with peers, with many network members delivering both oral and poster presentations highlighting their impactful work.

The Child Protection and Neurodevelopment Networks partnered to host a Satellite Day, which received excellent feedback. Attendees commended the event for its relevance and depth, especially appreciating the practical strategies and emphasis on cultural competence in child protection practice.

The NZCYES (Epidemiology Service) Satellite Day brought together regional leaders and Starting Well, sharing future directions of in-depth analysis.

PERIPROCEDURAL DIABETES CARE: NEW GUIDELINE NOW AVAILABLE

A new Australasian guideline on periprocedural management of children and adolescents with diabetes mellitus is now available on the Starship website. It is based on recently published research and has been co-developed by NZPES, ANZSPED, SPANZA, consumer representatives, and members of our Clinical Network for Children and Young People with Diabetes.



DOWN SYNDROME T21 GUIDELINES



The Neurodevelopment Clinical Network has reached an exciting milestone in updating the national clinical guidance for children and young people with Down syndrome in Aotearoa: view it here.

The previous guidance was more than 25 years old, and rather than simply “refreshing” it, the workstream has taken a new approach to make the material clearer, easier to navigate, and better aligned with current evidence and practice.

This represents a significant body of work and is a testament to the power of clinical networks in bringing expert knowledge together and turning it into practical, high-value resources.
